STUDENT COUNCIL BULLETIN

April 15, 1958

Mr. Martin notified the Student Council that the proposed student-faculty basketball game would not be held. No reason was given.

A suggestion was made that homework assignments be made lighter. Mr. Martin said that he would again recommend that the faculty leave a 15 to 20 minute study period at the ends of each period.

April 22, 1958

Lynn Miller suggested holding a Bermuda Shorts Day. Pete Adams moved, after some discussion as to regulation of knee-length, that we look into such a possibility; the motion was passed.

A suggestion was made that the trophy case should be moved to a more conspicuous place. The building of a permanent trophy case was proposed as a Student Council project.

April 29, 1958

A visitation to local junior high schools by Student Council members to give talks to those students who are to attend high school next year was proposed.

Friedl Tonidandel moved that we collect all unsold emblems and redistribute them for selling.

A committee was set up to provide for the election of Student Council members next year.

May 6, 1958

The moving out of the trophy cases from Miss Poag's office was again discussed. They are now on either side of the main door in the rotunda. Butch Atkinson suggested that we build a permanent case for them in the gymnasium.

Pete Adams suggested that the proportion of upper-classmen to lower classmen in the Student Council should be increased. After some discussion, this motion was laid on the table.

May 13, 1958

Butch Atkinson's suggestion of building a permanent case for the trophies was again discussed. The Army Engineers will make an estimate as to the cost, and, if it is not prohibitive, the case will be built this summer into the wall of the gym.

Butch Atkinson was officially reprimanded for his participation in a fight, an action "unbecoming of a Student Council member."

Groups of Student Council members will visit the local junior high schools on the 15th and 16th of this month. They are to "sell" Narimasu to the future freshmen by giving talks on the academic and moral standards of Narimasu as well as speeches on its extra-curricular activities.
