The Narimasu Dragons stomped the Yo-Hi Red Devils by the score of 29 to one in a game played in Yo-Hi's own park, Beach Field on 29 April.

Getting off to a good start in their bid to retain their Far East Command Crown, the Dragons won their second league game in a row. The Dragons, led by Gary Blackwell, who had a double and two home runs at four times at bat, battered six Yokohama pitchers for 29 runs on 21 hits including four home runs by Blackwell, Ravancek and Martin. George Keyser and Vince Patrem held the Red Devils to one run on three hits until the Yo-Hi coach threw in the towel at the end of the fifth inning.
