## Molly Bee Visits Narimasu

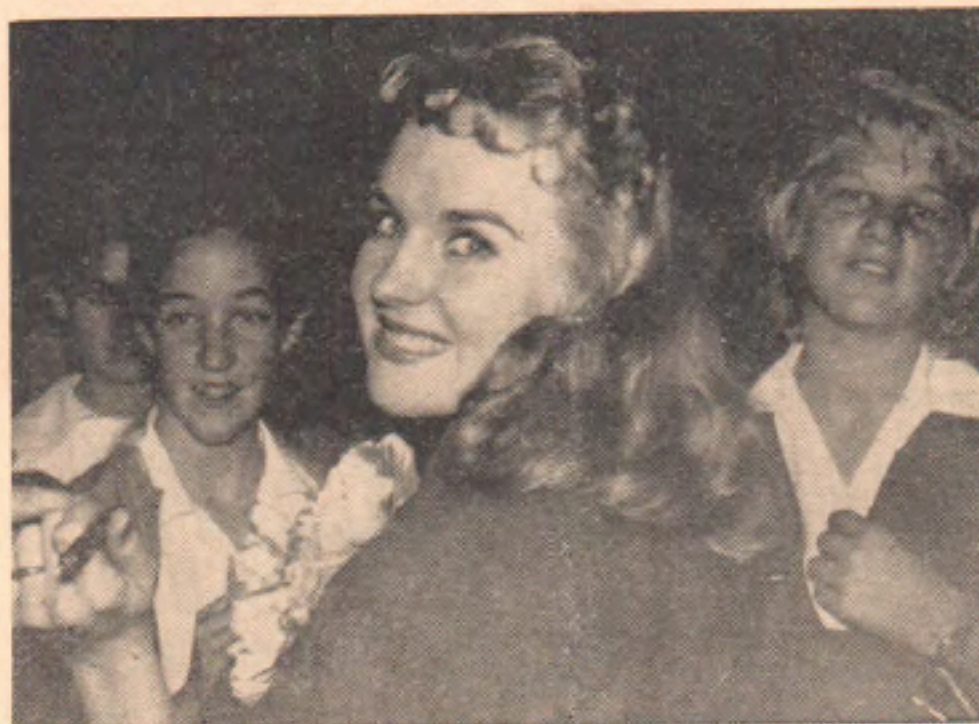
### Singer Well Received
